In this sphere, the students and staff of the college played a significant role and helped the society to come back strongly. Practice - College adopted multiple ways to manage the effects of corona. For the societal awareness NSS Unit of the College organized awareness camps, health camps and counselling programs. The volunteers went to slum areas and made the people aware of serious disease and spread the importance of health and hygiene. On the other hand, a help desk was constituted to help the college community. College also organized webinars to maintain the physical and mental health. Evidence of Success - During corona period college organized following programs - 1. A Help Desk consisting of seven teachers was made to help the students and staff and kept a keen eye on the health by measuring and examining the vitals. It prepared posters and banners on which the guidelines for prevention and cure were mentioned. 2. The Webinars were organized under DBT Star College scheme and NSS. a. Under the prestigious Central Govt. grant 'DBT Star College scheme' on 6th June 2020 a webinar 'Boosting Immunity with Ayurveda: A Possible Game Changer for Covid-19' was organized in which 186 students participated. b. NSS unit of Tika Ram College organized a Webinar on 19th June 2020 on "Changing Lifestyle in covid-19" in which the Vice Chancellor Dr. Ashok Mittal, State P.R.O. Dr. Anshumali Sharma, Regional Director Dr. Ashok Shroti, 200 participants including teachers and students were present. 3. Initiatives of National Service Scheme (NSS) a. Societal Awareness. During corona pandemic many awareness programs and creative activities were organized in which the students participated and made the society aware of the importance of social distancing and prevention from the disease. They helped the people in downloading Aarogya Setu app and Aayush Kawach app. They released audio and videos and appealed to the people to take care of the disease. The volunteers made 1300 masks and the 1,000 masks were distributed. b. Participating with Government Initiatives. From the portal of Government of India I got Diksha, the program officers and the volunteers got the training. College unit program officers were made mental health counsellor under 'Muskuraega India' initiative of Indian government 4. Online Classes - During this period, the teaching and learning process was not disrupted. During lockdown period immediately the classes were shifted from offline to online platform and the teachers continued the process valiantly. Best Practice 2. Annual Art Exhibition in Drawing and Painting department Goal: Exhibition is designed to encourage students to develop fine art skill and the ability to communicate the visual concepts of their paintings to a large audience. Context. The students are engaged in artmaking and communicating . They are encouraged to understand the major artistic styles and genres of various schools of art including Indian and Western. Drawing and painting department of college is a premier PG department of college with rich heritage. Department is proactive in organizing various departmental and college activities. Annual art exhibition being organized from 1990s is feel proud moment for department College management is patron of this annual exhibition. In the exhibition students display their murals, landscape, portraits, life-sketch and creative compositions. Students maintains a visitor's logbook to have the feedback of their artwork. Exhibitions is open for students and faculty members of different colleges in city Evidence of Success. This year department arranged two exhibitions 1. Annual Exhibition. This year the two day exhibition was organized on 12-13.02.20. Eighty artworks including murals, landscape, portraits, life-sketch and creative compositions were at display which were made by approximate 60 students from PG and UG classes. 150-200 Footfalls were noted in the exhibition. 2. District Level Kala Acharya Exhibition sponsored by Lalit Kala Academy Uttar Pradesh was held on 20- 21.09.2019 In this exhibition 54 artworks made by faculty members of colleges of Aligarh and nearby districts like Hathras, Kasganj and Etah were displayed.
